History and Meaning

Ascension of 'Abdu'l-Bahá is a day that commemorates the death of 'Abdu'l-Bahá, the eldest son and successor of Baha'u'llah, founder of the Baha'i faith. His funeral was attended by more than 10,000 mourners of all different religious backgrounds, and his body was laid to rest in a vault next to the vault of the Báb on Mount Carmel. 'Abdu'l-Bahá means "servant of Bahá." Baha'i followers wanted to honor him on his birthday, May 23, but that was already a day of great significance — the declaration of the Báb. 'Abdu'l-Bahá was very humble and dedicated to his faith. He did not want to be celebrated on his birthday, so Baha'i followers decided to honor him on his deathday.

Relevant Observances

- Gather in prayer, worship and celebration of unity and acceptance.
- All are welcome to join the celebration regardless of differences in faith or beliefs.

Tips for Supporting Patients
