## **Pregnancy Screening Policy Changes**

With a better understanding of the radiation risks to a fetus, and for reasons related to gender health equity, Johns Hopkins Radiology has updated their pregnancy screening policy for exams utilizing x-rays.

Starting on August 1, 2024, patients will only be screened for pregnancy before CT or x-ray exams that would result in direct fetal exposure.

Patients will be screened for pregnancy for all MRI, Nuclear Medicine/PET, Interventional Radiology, DEXA and Mammography exams.

#### **Rationale:**

• If a potential fetus is outside of the imaging area, the radiation dose to the fetus is negligible. Fetal radiation exposure is not a concern in these situations.

#### **EPIC Ordering Changes:**

- *"Is the patient pregnant?"* has been removed from the list of ordering questions for all exams outside the lower torso (head, neck, chest, & extremity exams).
- The question will remain for exams where a potential fetus would be directly exposed, or in the field of view of the final image.
- If the patient is known to be pregnant, discuss risks/benefits of the exams with the patient and document that this conversation took place in the order notes.

### **Emergency Department:**

• Starting on August 1<sup>st</sup>, Radiology will no longer wait for results of an HCG pregnancy test for CTs or x-rays of head, chest, and extremities. If the patient is getting a CT or an X-ray in the abdominal, pelvic, lumbar region, then the technologists will wait for the labs, unless the ordering provider overrides it for urgency.
